4. The Committee are grateful to the representatives of the Sports Department who appeared before them for oral examination.

5. The Committee place on record their high appreciation of the whole hearted cooperation and unstinted assistance given to it by the Secretary, Haryana Vidhan Sabha and his staff.

ESTIMATES COMMITTEE

REPORT

1. The Estimates Committee for the year 1976-77 was elected by the Vidhan Sabha consisting of nine Members and notified *vide* Haryana Vidhan Sabha Secretariat Notification No. EC-3/76-77/8, dated the 28th April, 1976.

2. Rao Nihal Singh, M.L.A. was nominated Chairman of the Committee by the Hon Speaker.

3. The Committee held 34 sittings at Chandigarh, till the finalisation of the Report.

4. The Committee selected the following Departments with a view to scrutinize their Budget Estimates for the year 1976-77:—

1. Dairy Development,
2. Tourism.
3. P.W.D. (Public Health,)
4. Sports, and
5. Consumer Cooperative Stores functioning at Chandigarh, Ambala, Faridabad and Hissar.

5. The Committee scrutinised the material relating to the Budget Estimates of the Sports Department for the year 1976-77 and orally examined the representatives of this Department.

6. The Committee could not examine the following departments due to the reasons mentioned against each department:—

1. *Dairy Development Department*:—Replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee were not received from the department.

2. *Tourism Department*:—Non-receipt of the replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee from the Department.

3. *PWD (Public Health)*:—Replies to the questionnaire were received when the term of the Committee was nearing completion.

4. *Consumer Co-operative Stores functioning at Chandigarh Ambala, Faridabad and Hissar*:—Consumer Cooperative Stores could not be examined due to the late receipt of the material

7. The Committee also scrutinised the Supplementary Estimates of the Government of Haryana for the year 1976-77 (1st, 2nd and 3rd Instalments) and examined the representatives of the Finance as well as other departments concerned with the demands and submitted their

reports thereon to the Vidhan Sabha on the 6th July, 1976, 15th November, 1976, 24th March, 1977 respectively.

Importance of Sports

The future of the country depends upon the quality and versatility of its youth in building in a new society. The most important object of Sports relates to over all development of youth and to train and prepare them to play a constructive role in society and active participation in national life. It is well known that the youth of a country have a significant role to play in imparting vitality and momentum to the life of community. It is well known maxim that the character of nation is always moulded in its play grounds.

This immense human resource which the youth represent should be harnessed to the utmost in the developmental efforts of the country. The vital role of sports and games for equipping the youth with these qualities is now widely recognised. Sports and games form an integral part of our educational pattern in schools and colleges. Sports not only provide amusement but also strengthen friendship and comradeship. For an integrated development of body and mind, sports and games are essential. It is also a historical fact that the battle of Waterloo was won in the grounds.

Haryana has been traditionally described as the 'Sword Arm of India'. No other part of India is more keenly sports conscious than the State of Haryana, nor is there any other State where games and sports are generously patronised traditionally. Haryana is the proverbial land of strong bodies and sinewy limbs. It is generally held that strength of the nation is related to the sports mindedness of its citizens.

It is true that there is no dearth of good talent in Haryana. If we are able to unearth and train the hidden and dormant material lying latent in the multitude of our population by providing adequate opportunities of coaching and frequent participation in competition, there is no reason why our sportsmen/women should not take their right full place among the leading star of the world. The past performance of our young men/women in the field of sports sufficiently substantiates this. Padamshri Chandgi Ram, Shri Ude Chand, Hony. Lieutenant, Sh. Lila Ram, Sh. Jagroop Singh, Sub. Major Sajjan Singh, Sh. Netar Pal Singh, Sh. Hukam Singh, Sh. Radhey Shyam, Sub. Hawa Sing, Nb. Sub. Mehtab Singh, Nb. Sub. Bhim Singh, Sh. Jagraj Singh, Sh. Bahadur Singh, Miss Gita Zutshi, Miss Manjula, Sh. Balwant Singh, Sh. Mohan Lal Singha, Shri Jai Karan Rana, Sh. Khushi Ram, these leading sportsmen/women of the country belong to Haryana.

The Haryana State does not lag behind in the service of the defence of the country also. Its soldiers like Major Hoshier Singh have won the highest national defence award in the country. There are many other soldiers who have brought laurels to the State as well as to the country in the wars fought recently.

It is in this background that the Estimates Committee examined the budget estimates of the department for the year 1976-77.

9. In reply to the questionnaire, the department furnished following information regarding the organisational set up of the Department —

The posts which have been created for the headquarters as well as for the field offices after 31-3-1972 are shown under with proportionate increase —

To impart quality coaching and training to budding Sportsmen/ Women on most modern lines the Motilal Nehru School of Sports, Rai has been set up and Kamla Nehru School is a Junior Wing which acts as feeder to Motilal Nehru School of Sports, Rai (Sonepat) All the posts for efficient running of these institutions have been created after 31-3-1972.

Sports Department

10. The Departmental representative stated in written evidence that at the time of formation of Haryana State the following schemes were in existence :—

Measures taken by the Department to popularise Sports and Games

1. Coaching
2. Award of Scholarships to outstanding Sportsmen/Women.
3. Sports Council Grant-in-aid.
4. Yoga
5. Construction of Stadia.

It was further brought in the notice of the Committee that Government have now taken active steps to encourage sports and create sports consciousness among the youth. Sports and Games form an integral part of our educational pattern in Schools and Colleges. Special institutions have been set up under the charge of experts, competitions and tournaments are held and various incentives provided to attract talented young men and women for participating in the National and International Sports competitions.

Apart from this, a number of new schemes have been introduced by the State Government for the promotion of Sports activities in addition to the schemes which were already taken up by the erstwhile Punjab State for the promotion of Sports :—

- (i) Cash Awards to outstanding Sportsmen.
- (ii) Stipends for getting training at NIS Patiala.
- (iii) Minor Mountaineering and Trekking.
- (iv) Motilal Nehru School of Sports, Rai.
- (v) Rural Sports Centere

General observations

11. The Committee in their meeting held on 23rd December, 1976, observed that the Government departments, Haryana do not send the material and the replies to questionnaire to the Committee in time when asked for. The Committee desired that the Commissioner and Secretary to Government, Haryana Finance Department be asked to issue a directive to all the Secretaries to Government, Haryana, requesting them to keep ready the material on the budget estimates relating to their respective departments to be supplied to the Committee on any time after the 30th April, of each year. Similarly, the departments may further, be asked to supply the replies to the questionnaire prepared

by the Committee within two weeks positively after the receipt of the questionnaire by the Government. The Committee would take serious note if the material as asked for by them is not supplied within a period of two weeks on receipt of the letter from the Vidhan Sabha Secretariat after the 30th April.

The Commissioner and Secretary to Govt., Haryana, Finance Department has accordingly issued the following directive to all the Administrative Secretaries vide his U.N. No. 10-VS-(4 B&C)-77, dated the 18th January, 1977.

Will the Administrative Secretaries to Government Haryana kindly refer to the enclosed copy of letter No. EC-27/76-77/520, dated the 13th January, 1977, from the Secretary, Haryana Vidhan Sabha alongwith a copy of extracts of the proceedings of the meeting of the Estimates Committee held on the 23rd December, 1976 referred to therein on the subject noted above ?

As desired therein they are requested to ensure that replies to the questionnaire of the Committee in respect of their departments are sent to the Secretary, Haryana Vidhan Sabha within two weeks of the receipt of the same. They are also requested to take a serious view against the departments under their administrative control who fail to supply the requisite information to the Committee.

The Committee accordingly recommend to the Government that the time limits for supplying material on the budget estimates and replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee, be strictly adhered to, failing which a serious view of the matter would be taken.

12. The Commissioner and Secretary to Govt. Haryana, Tourism

Tourism Department delay in supply of the material on Budget Estimates and non supply of the replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee

Department was requested vide Vidhan Sabha Secretariat letter No. EC-19/76-77/11413 dated 19.5.76 to supply the material in support of its budget estimates for the year 1976-77 within a fortnight. It was also made quite clear in the above mentioned letter that the Committee would view with dis-favour if its work is hampered or delayed due to the non-receipt of the material in time. As the material in question was not received, reminders were sent to the Secretary to Government, Haryana, Tourism Department on 3.6.76, 14.6.76, 13.7.76 and 28.8.76 to expedite the material which was actually received on 9.8.76. The Committee framed the questionnaire and sent the same to the department on 23.9.1976 to furnish its written replies thereto. The department was reminded on 28.10.76, 16.11.1976, and demi-officially on 26.11.76, 9.12.76 and 25.2.77 to expedite the replies asked for but the replies to the questionnaire were not received. The Committee are pained to observe that the Tourism Department has not sent its replies to the questionnaire in spite of various reminders/D.O. letters written to the Administrative Secretary by the Vidhan Sabha Secretariat and the directive of the Finance Department as re-produced in para 11 of this Report.

The Committee feel that the non-supply of the replies to the questionnaire is a very serious matter as it has held up the work of the Committee. Consequently, neither the budget estimates of the department could be examined nor a report could be prepared for presentation to the House. The Committee recommend that the Government should fix the responsibility on the officers/officials who are responsible for this deliberate non supply of the replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee. The Committee be informed in the matter accordingly.

✓ 13. The Commissioner and Secretary to Government Haryana, Dairy Development Department was requested vide Vidhan Sabha Secretariat letter No. EC-18/76-77/11410, dated 19.5.76 to supply the material in support of its Budget Estimates for the year 1976-77 within a fortnight. It was also made quite clear in the above mentioned letter that the Committee would view with dis-favour if its work is hampered or delayed due to the non-receipt of the material in time.

Dairy Development Department Corporation delay in supply of the material on Budget Estimates and nonsupply of the replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee

As the material in question was not received, reminders were sent to the Secretary to Government, Haryana Dairy Development Department on 3-6-76, 16-6-76, 29-6-76 and 13-7-76 to expedite the material which was actually received on 19-7-76. The Committee framed the questionnaire and sent the same to the department on 13-11-1976 to furnish its written replies there to. The Department was reminded demi-officially on 26-11-1976, 9-12-76, 13-1-77 and 25-2-1977 to expedite the replies asked for, but the replies to the questionnaire were not received. The Committee are constrained to observe that the Dairy Development Department has not sent its replies to the questionnaire inspite of the various demi-official letters written to the Administrative Secretary of the Department by the Vidhan Sabha Secretariat and the Directive of the Finance Department as reproduced in para 11 of this Report.

The Committee feel that the non-supply of the replies to the questionnaire is a very serious matter and it has held up the work of the Committee. Consequently, neither the Budget Estimates of the Department could be examined nor a Report could be prepared for presentation to the House. The Committee recommend that the Government should fix the responsibility on the officers/officials who are responsible for this deliberate non-supply of the replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee. The action taken by the Government in this respect against defaulting officer/official may be informed to the Committee accordingly.

14. The Commissioner and Secretary to Government, Haryana, Public Works Department (Public Health) was requested vide Vidhan Sabha letter No. EC-21/76-77/11419, dated 19-5-76 to supply the material in support of its budget estimates for the year 1976-77 within a fortnight. It was made quite clear in the above mentioned letter that the Committee would view with disfavour if its work is hampered or delayed due to the

Public Works Department (Public Health) delay in supply of the material on budget estimates and non supply of the replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee

non receipt of the material in time. As the material in question was not received, reminders were sent to the Secretary to Government, Haryana Public Works Department (Public Health) on 3-6-76, 16-6-76, 13-7-76 to expedite the material-which was actually received on 15-7-76. The Committee framed the questionnaire and sent the same to the department on 1-9-76 to furnish its written replies thereto. The Department was reminded on 15-10-76, 6-10-76, 28-10-76, 16-11-76 and semi-officially on 24-11-76, 9-12-76, 13-1-77 to expedite the replies asked for. The replies to the questionnaire were received in Vidhan Sabha Secretariat after a prolonged correspondence on 16-2-1977. The Committee are pained to observe that the department has not sent its replies to the questionnaire, well in time, in spite of various reminders/D.O. letters written to the Administrative Secretary by the Vidhan Secretariat and the directive of the Finance Department as reproduced in para 11 of this Report.

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The replies to the questionnaire were received on 16-2-77 the Committee could not find time to scrutinize the replies and examine the budget estimates of the department, because the term of the Committee was nearing completion.

The Committee feel that there was a deliberate attempt to supply the replies to questionnaire late and there was no justification whatsoever for doing so. The Committee view this lapse seriously and recommend to the Government that the responsibility be fixed on the officers/officials for late supply of the material on the budget estimates and replies to the questionnaire framed by the Committee. The Committee be informed of the action taken in the matter.

15. The Department was asked on 19-5-1976 to supply material

Delay in supplying material in support of budget estimates and replies to the questionnaire regarding Sports Department.

on the budget estimates for the year 1976-77. On 3-6-1976 and 16-6-1976 the department was reminded to supply the material in question, which was actually received on 26-6-1976. The Committee framed questionnaire on the material so supplied and sent the same to the department on 13-8-1976 to furnish written replies there to. The department took no action. Accordingly, they were reminded vide reminders dated 30-8-1976, 15-9-1976, 1-10-1976, 28-10-1976, 16-11-1976 and semi-officially reminded on 26-11-1976 and 9-12-1976. Eventually the department furnished the written replies on 23-12-1976 and thus the work of the Committee was held up. First, the department took more than one month to send the material in support of its budget estimates and there after the Department took more than four months to send the written replies to the questionnaire. When the departmental representative was asked to explain the reasons for such inordinate delay, he regretted the delay and said no explanation could be good enough for this.

The Committee feel that the delay in supplying the material on budget estimates and replied to the questionnaire was not justified and it reflects adversely on the efficiency of the department. In view of the regrets offered by the departmental representative the Committee do not intend to pursue this matter, further, but suggests that the Government should tone up the Administration of the Department.

16. The Departmental Representative stated during the course of oral examination that there is no independent whole time Director of the Department at present. Director of Public Instructions is holding additional charge of this post. Likewise there is a post of part-time additional Director, whose incumbent is also doing the job on this post in addition to other port-folios he is holding. So virtually the Deputy Director is running the Department. The Committee is not satisfied with this arrangement. Moreover, the Director of Public Instructions who is holding the additional charge of the post of Director-Sports is over loaded with the work of his own department and he hardly finds time to give attention towards the functioning of this department. Since the post of Director-Sports has been created by the Government, keeping in view, the importance of sports in the State and on account of increase of work load of the department, the Committee see no reason why this post be not manned by an independent whole time Director Sports.

Further, it was noticed that the post of Director has been sanctioned in IAS Cadre. Every IAS Officer cannot be outstanding sportsman. The Committee, therefore, recommend to the Government that for the promotion of sports activities in the State an IAS Officer having the background and aptitude for the sports may be appointed whole time Director of Sports at the earliest and the Committee may be informed accordingly.

17. As observed there is one post of Additional Director part time in the department who performs following duties :—

Additional Director of Sports

1. Grant of Temporary advance out of G.P.F to the staff of the Department.
2. Sanction of leave/advances as allowed by the Government from time to time.
3. Sanction of coaching camp.
4. Transfer of coaches of NIS Patiala & non-gazetted staff of the Department.
5. Cases regarding training for non-gazetted staff
6. Deputation of non-gazetted staff.
7. Crossing of EB by non-gazetted staff.
8. Purchase of Stationery.
9. Issue of Sports Certificates B, C, and D.
10. Cases regarding interview of the candidates for *ad hoc* appointments.

11. Any other cases required to be submitted.

As already noticed this post is held by an officer in addition to his own duties, when there will be one independent whole time Director of Sports as recommended by the Committee in para- 16 of this Report. He can very well look after the work of the additional Director also. It is seen from above that the duties performed by the Additional Director are not of so intricate or of technical nature, and the post being a part time, this job can be assigned to the Director or Deputy Director. This post may be abolished.

18. In reply to the questionnaire the department has stated in written evidence that there is one post of sports office Class II at the Head Quarters. No specific duties have been assigned to him. When the attention of the departmental representative during the course of oral examination was drawn to this fact he stated that earlier there was no technical man (Sports) at the Head Quarters so that the incumbent of this post may advise in technical matters. The Committee are not satisfied with this explanation. The Sports Officers are required to do their duties in the field for promotion of sports and talents cannot be languished at the Head Quarters office for routine type of jobs. As already recommended by the Committee in para 16 of this Report, when there will be a whole time Director well-versed in sports matters, he will not be required "technical advice of the sports officer.

However, the committee recommend to the Government that when a whole-time Director of the department is appointed by the Government then the justification for retaining this post at Head Quarters may be seen by the Government and the decision taken in this respect by the Government may be communicated to the Committee

19. There is one post of Sectional Officer (class III) sanctioned in the Moti Lal Nehru School of Sports, Rai. When asked to explain the justification for this post, the departmental representative stated in oral evidence that the post is superfluous and not necessary. The Committee recommend that the post of Sectional Officer be abolished forthwith.

20. There is one post of District Sports Officer and Coach at every District Head Quarter. The Committee was of the view that they have not done any thing worth the name towards promotion of sports in their respective districts. The Departmental representative stated in oral evidence that their performance depends upon the interest evinced by the respective Deputy Commissioners in sports etc. The Committee was not satisfied with the prevailing situation in the sports field and desired that the District sports Officer and Coaches should do concrete work to justify their existence. The Committee further recommend to the Government that special efforts be made to recruit the efficient persons as

Coaches at the earliest so that training of the students do not suffer. The Committee during the course of oral examination observed that special attention has not been paid by the department towards games like, foot-ball, Cricket, Yoga and athletics. The Committee, therefore 'recommend that special attention may be paid by the Department towards the above mentioned games.

The Committee recommend to the Government that the District Sports Officers should have a liaison with the District Education officer as well as other Educational Institutions of the districts with a view to promote the Sports activities in their respective districts.

The Committee further recommend to the Government that respective Deputy Commissioners should watch the performance of the District Sports Officers periodically in their respective districts.

The Committee further recommend to the Government that the respective Deputy Commissioners should ensure the promotion of Sports activities in their districts and periodical progress report in this respect may be sent to the Government by the Deputy Commissioners. Steps taken in this respect may be communicated to the Committee as well.

21. The Departmental representative stated in written evidence **Admission to talented sports-men** that the special board in its meeting held on 2-2-1977 decided to begin with ten seats in class VIIth entrance test should be reserved for outstanding Sportsmen and also for those who possess talents and promising in sports. This number will be increased to 25. Further, it was also decided that any sportsman securing in a medal at national level or performance is equivalent to that of a medal may also be allowed for lateral entry in Class VIIIth, IXth and Xth. They will be given relaxation in the prescribed qualifying admissions test.

The Committee would like to be informed of the action taken towards implementation of the decision of the Board.

22. There is one Yoga Centre at Yamunanagar in Ambala District, **Stadia and Yoga Centres at District Head Quarters** and Stadia's at Jind, Hissar, Karnal, Gurgaon and Sonapat. The Committee were informed that stadia at Bhiwani and Ambala are under construction. The Committee, were, further, informed that efforts are being made to build the Stadia's at the remaining District Head Quarters also.

The Committee feel that there should be atleast one Yoga Centre and Stadium at every District Head Quarter in the State to promote the sports activities. The Committee recommend that the Government should ensure the implementation of plan of one stadium and one Yoga Centre at every District Head Quarter within the year 1977-78.

23. The Departmental Representative, Haryana, on oral examination stated before the Committee that admission to these schools is made on the basis of intelligence test, physical test, the efficiency and merit. The Committee asked the Departmental Representative that the admission to these schools should be made on the basis of sports potentials of the students. The departmental representative stated in evidence that the intention of setting up the school was the over all development of the children in the academic and sports. The intention was never to produce merely sportsmen. He further stated that we do want that some people out of the school should become outstanding sportsmen also. We have a scheme to spot out children in the age group of 10-12 and have promise of becoming good sportsmen. They will be given special coaching in sports school and then we hope to produce National Level Champions. The Departmental representative further stated that they are devising a scientific method to adjudge the sports potential of the student, in consultation with NIS experts.

The Committee would like to know as to what scientific method has been evolved for the purpose and desired to know the details thereof.

The Committee feel that if higher standard of academics is the only criterion for admission in these institutions then the entrants having urban background with frail physical standard will have their way and the children having sturdy physical standards with less academic standards will be thrown into the background since the school is primarily meant for promotion of sports the students possessing sound physique be given preference over those who are academically talented but lacking in physical standards.

During the course of oral examination the Committee pointed out that the post of Chief Medical Officer and other supporting staff was in excess of the actual requirement and wanted to know the norms on which the same have been sanctioned. The Departmental Representative stated that the Chief Medical Officer and other staff mentioned by them are sanctioned one and not in position as such. There is proposal to set up a 25 beded hospital in the School Campus and a 10 beded hospital has been set up uptil now. The Committee asked for the justification of a hospital of so much bed strength and staff. The Committee was of the view that such a hospital in sports school was really not necessary. In the school, there are sports boys and girls and not patients to be looked after. The departmental representative furnished the written information which reads as under :—

1. Twice a year annual medical check-up of each student and progress in health noted in a "Medical History Chart" and afterwards medical report is sent to each parents.
2. Providing prophylactic cover to all the students and staff against Malaria and infectious disease and other like Tetanus etc.
3. Medical care and hospitalisation during illness of students and the staff.
4. Medical care during convalescence.
5. Medical care to all the participants in various sports camps in the school.

6. Looking and keeping a check on the balanced diet in-take of all students and responsibility for efficient running of the school messes.

7. Procurement of food articles and their preservation.
